Storm Boris

Storm Boris caused devastating floods across central Europe, with Austria, Poland, Czechia, Slovakia, Germany and Hungary experiencing over a month's worth of rain in just a few days. The Polish government declared a state of emergency, many towns in Czechia are without electricity and hot water, and evacuations are underway across several other countries.

In the face of this crisis, **#Scouts** responded:

In Poland, Scouts have mobilised to affected areas, offering critical psychological support to those impacted.

In Czechia, Scouts are assisting local authorities and emergency services with preventive measures, while Scout centres are providing shelter for evacuees.

Scouts in Austria, Hungary, Germany and Slovakia are assessing the ongoing impact and standing by their communities, offering hands-on assistance where it's needed most.





Wildfires - Greece

Over two months, over 500 fires erupted in Greece, causing the destruction of more than 750 000 acres of forest.

In the face of this crisis, **#Scouts** responded:

GR Volunteered and coordinated with municipalities, civil society groups, and citizens.

Patrolled forest areas to help prevent wildfire spread.

Assisted in restoring damaged buildings and supporting local communities.

Provided food, hygiene products, and basic supplies to vulnerable groups.


Collected aid for wildfire victims and firefighters.

Collaborated with civil protection and local authorities on fire protection efforts.

The Greek scouts continue to work towards preparedness and are working with the national authorities on a 6-year reforestation programme.







UAct – War in Ukraine

- 35,000 Scouts supported Ukrainian children and families across Ukraine and neighbouring countries.
- Provided shelter, border support, essential items, daycare, and psychological first aid.
- Helped over 9,000 young Ukrainians join local Scout groups and camps.
- Ran educational and skills-building activities in shelters and youth centres.
- Integrated refugee children into local Scout groups in nine countries.
- Adapted youth programs to support integration and resilience.
- Managed UNICEF Blue Dots to assist refugee families with key information.
- Hungarian Scouts worked with the Ministry of Education to support Ukrainian students.

Ongoing efforts continue to engage and support Ukrainian youth through Scouting activities and crisis preparedness.



Project, Partnership Objective & Goal

Our key objective is to provide on-the-ground emergency support to children and young people displaced or affected by the war in Ukraine.

This includes supply distribution, referral to Blue Dots and other services, integration efforts and non-formal education.

The goal of the project is to leverage a universal youth engagement platform by mobilizing and orienting Scouts and young volunteers to support UNICEF ECARO cross-sectoral response to the Ukraine refugee crisis through the **delivery of frontline support, integration, competency-building methods and meaningful participation.**




Long term

The future

Active inclusion – share social responsibility - By understanding the value of inclusiveness and social cohesion, Scouts engage as change agents and peer support in their communities by removing barriers to participation and integrating new and underrepresented groups.

- Education Design, promote, and disseminate educational programmes and capacity-building training, integrating components for preparedness into new and current initiatives.
